
THE GOSPEL

The Holy Gospel is written in the twelfth chapter of the Gospel according to St Luke, beginning at the twenty-second verse.

Glory be to thee, O Lord.

And he said unto his disciples, Therefore I say unto you, Take no thought for your life, what ye shall eat; neither for the body, what ye shall put on. The life is more than meat, and the body is more than raiment. Consider the ravens: for they neither sow nor reap; which neither have storehouse nor barn; and God feedeth them: how much more are ye better than the fowls? And which of you with taking thought can add to his stature one cubit? If ye then be not able to do that thing which is least, why take ye thought for the rest? Consider the lilies how they grow: they toil not, they spin not; and yet I say unto you, that Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. If then God so clothe the grass, which is to day in the field, and to morrow is cast into the oven; how much more will he clothe you, O ye of little faith? And seek not ye what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink, neither be ye of doubtful mind. For all these things do the nations of the world seek after: and your Father knoweth that ye have need of these things. But rather seek ye the kingdom of God; and all these things shall be added unto you. **Praise be to thee, O Christ.**

THE PRAYER OF HUMBLE ACCESS


E do not presume

THE PRAYER OF CONSECRATION

A LMIGHTY God, our heavenly Father, who of thy tender mercy, didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the Cross for our redemption; who made there (by his one oblation of himself once offered) a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, for the sins of the whole world; and did institute, and in his holy Gospel command us to continue, a perpetual memory of that his precious death, until his coming again: Hear us, O merciful Father, we most humbly beseech thee; and grant that by the power of the Holy Spirit, we receiving these thy creatures of bread and wine, according to thy Son our Saviour Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed + Body and Blood: Who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took Bread; and when he had given thanks, he brake it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: *Take, eat, this is my Body, which is given for you; Do this in remembrance of me.* Likewise, after supper, he took the Cup; and, when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying: *Drink ye all of this; for this is my Blood of the New Testament, which is shed for you, and for many, for the remission of sins; Do this, as oft as ye shall drink it, in remembrance of me.* **Amen.**

 \P In accordance with the Anglican tradition, Holy Communion is administered in both kinds i.e the consecrated Bread and Wine. During the current pandemic, this can only be offered by intinction ie the consecrated wafer dipped in the consecrated wine, as the sharing of the Common Cup (Chalice) by sipping the consecrated wine is not permitted.


UR Father,

THE ORGAN VOLUNTARY GF Handel Hornpipe in D from The Water Music Organist: Andrew Morris



This painting depicts the late summer harvest in Flanders. More than forty people are engaged in various activities against a background of low hills and a valley. The church tower is half hidden behind the branch of a pear tree and a group of hungry people sit below eating and drinking. They are consuming bowls with milk and cereals, pears from the tree, bread and cheese. The person on the left is already asleep. A young man with a jar of water walks up the hill through a path through the golden wheat field. Several people mow the grain with scythes, others bind it into sheaves whilst others carry them down the hill. A cart full of wheat drives down the hill. Bruegel did not romanticize this agricultural scene but painted a realistic picture of peasants in late summer. He was one of the early painters who abandoned religious or classical themes in his paintings to focus on the people. The unidealized description of this local scene is based on natural observations. ¹
