First Lesson

Here beginneth the seventeenth verse of the fourth chapter of the Epistle of St Paul to the Ephesians.

THIS I say therefore, and testify in the Lord, that ye henceforth walk not as other Gentiles walk, in 1 the vanity of their mind; having the understanding darkened, being alienated from the life of God through the ignorance that is in them, because of the blindness of their heart: who, being past feeling, have given themselves over unto lasciviousness, to work all uncleanness with greediness. But ye have not so learned Christ; if so be that ye have heard him, and have been taught by him, as the truth is in Jesus: that ye put off, concerning the former conversation, the old man, which is corrupt according to the deceitful lusts; and be renewed in the spirit of your mind; and that ye put on the new man, which after God is created in righteousness and true holiness. Wherefore, putting away lying, speak every man truth with his neighbour: for we are members one of another. Be ye angry and sin not: let not the sun go down upon your wrath: neither give place to the devil. Let him that stole steal no more; but rather let him labour, working with his hands the thing which is good, that he may have to give to him that needeth. Let no corrupt communication proceed out of your mouth, but that which is good to the use of edifying, that it may minister grace unto the hearers. And grieve not the Holy Spirit of God, whereby ye are sealed unto the day of redemption. Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and clamour, and evil-speaking, be put away from you, with all malice. And be ye kind one to another, tender-hearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you.

Second Lesson

Here beginneth the ninth chapter of the Gospel according to St Matthew.

J^{ESUS} entered into a ship, and passed over, and came into his own city. And behold, they brought to him a man sick of the palsy, lying on a bed. And Jesus, seeing their faith, said unto the sick of the palsy, Son, be of good cheer, thy sins be forgiven thee. And behold, certain of the Scribes said within themselves, This man blasphemeth. And Jesus, knowing their thoughts, said, Wherefore think ye evil in your hearts? For whether is easier, to say, Thy sins be forgiven thee? or to say, Arise, and walk? But that ye may know that the Son of man hath power on earth to forgive sins, (then saith he to the sick of the palsy,) Arise, take up thy bed, and go unto thine house. And he arose, and departed to his house. But when the multitude saw it, they marvelled, and glorified God, who had given such power unto men.

Front Cover Painting

The painting shows Jesus in the act of helping the sick. The pool of Bethesda in Jerusalem was periodically visited by an angel who is seen here hovering in the sky amid golden light. Whoever touched the water first after this would be cured of illness. Jesus went to the pool where he heard a sick man complain that someone always stepped into the water before him. Christ spoke to him, "Arise, take up thy bed, and go unto thine house." And the man was cured.

Jesus extends his arm gracefully inviting the elderly man to stand. Their mirrored hands capture the powerful connection between them. The man's raised arms create an upward motion as if he is being lifted from the ground by an invisible force evoking the miracle taking place. Peter, John and a third apostle witness the event. The jug, the bowl and the man's crutch would have been familiar to contemporary viewers. These and the sniffing dog add a sense of immediacy to the scene helping viewers to identify with it. This picture was part of a series of six large paintings Murillo made for the church of the Hospital de la Caridad in Seville. The Caridad was a charitable brotherhood dedicated to helping the poor and sick and Murillo was a member. At this time the artist's work was in high demand and the series was one of his most important commissions. It depicted six of the seven acts of charity described in St Matthew's gospel: helping the sick, feeding the hungry, replenishing the thirsty, dressing the naked, sheltering the homeless, and visiting prisoners. The seventh act, burying the dead, was represented by a sculpture of Christ's entombment, which formed part of the church's high altar where it remains.
